Each soldier and officer documented has their own biographical section, with a very good analysis of their role in Stuart's cavalry. This is my kind of book- I love details! Each section on an individual is a compilation of a life, and in most cases these men have almost been forgotten by time. They say that when a person is remembered, they live again, and Mr. Trout has done a marvelous job of allowing us to read and learn about the lives of men who gave their very best for what they believed in. From Library Journal Numerous books have been written about the life and exploits of J.E.B Stuart, but this is the first one that gives a complete biographical record of all the officers and enlisted men that made up his staff. Trout, a former editor of the Southern Cavalry, has done extensive research into the background and military records of each individual and indicates his role in all of Stuart's military campaigns. The book clearly shows that Stuart was totally devoted to the members of his staff and that they in return were loyal to him. In addition to the individual biographies, Trout also adds a staff history, a roster of all personnel assigned to Stuart's headquarters, staff officers' duties, regulations regarding staff officers' uniforms, and a thorough bibliography. This book fills an important void in Civil War history; it will appeal to general readers and Civil War buffs alike. Public and academic libraries will want it in their collections.- W.
